

Roman Catholic Provinces and Episcopal Church Dioceses

Revised May 2026

Anglicans and Roman Catholics are committed formally to the full, visible unity of the Church. In the United States, this ecumenical relationship is between the US Conference of Catholic Bishops and The Episcopal Church, encouraged by the work of the Anglican-Roman Catholic Dialogue Consultation in the United States (ARCUSA), meeting regularly since 1967. Some Episcopal dioceses and Roman Catholic dioceses have entered into local ecumenical covenants and agreements. Diocesan ecumenical officers serve in each church through the Catholic Association of Diocesan Ecumenical and Interreligious Officers (CADEIO) and Episcopal Diocesan Ecumenical and Interreligious Officers (EDEIO).

This chart shows approximate correspondence for the geographical Roman Catholic archdioceses and Episcopal dioceses in an effort to facilitate local contact and collaboration.
